WHAT DO I NEED TO KNOW OR BE ABLE TO DO BEFORE TAKING THIS COURSE?

Students should have a good command of English, demonstrated by a grade 5 or above in GCSE English Language and a Grade 5 in any Humanities subject. Students should possess good powers of analysis and have an interest in current affairs and society. The course specification provides an approach to Government and Politics that allows candidates to acquire knowledge and understanding of the political dimension within their own and other societies. This includes knowledge and understanding of authority, control and power and the nature and articulation of different interests in western societies. Candidates will develop an understanding of political systems and study different levels of government, comparing the practices of the British and United States systems of government. Candidates will have the opportunity to study different political

ideologies and theories; for example conservatism, environmentalism, liberalism and socialism.

WHAT WILL I LEARN ON THIS ADVANCED GCE COURSE?
