

Update from the Headteacher

Dear Parent/Carer

In what has felt like a week of significant news, schools have also seen a number of key announcements.

The first arrived last Friday, not long after last week's T-bulletin was sent, and was the much anticipated consultation on alternative arrangements for this year's GCSEs, A levels and vocational examinations. Parents and students in year groups who are directly affected have received a detailed summary of the proposals but any parent or student can submit a response. The full consultation document can be found <u>here</u> and responses can be made online <u>here</u>. The closing date for responses is 29th January 11.45 p.m.

On Sunday, the issue of rapid testing in schools was being raised in the press. The main debate surrounded the use of these tests on a daily basis for 'close contacts' to avoid the need for self isolation. Schools have now been instructed that the plans for serial, daily testing of close contacts will be paused, but we should continue with our arrangements for routine testing of staff and those students working on site who wish to do so on a twice weekly basis.

At Ashlyns, we have been fortunate to have a committed group of staff who have undergone thorough training and are ready to roll out whatever the renewed plan is when we welcome all students and staff back to school.

On that note, the Secretary of State for Education has pledged to give schools and parents two weeks' notice of any return to school so that effective preparations can be made. Once we receive this notification, we will of course keep you updated with the finer details of the plan for safe return to the physical school building; however, once again I would like to acknowledge the hard work, determination and resilience of our staff and students as they continue with remote learning.

I am aware that many students miss visiting our school library and meeting the range of authors we host. In addition to highlighting our virtual LRC (see LRC News in the right hand margin), please encourage your child to check out the Virtual School Library at the Oak National Academy. Each week a popular children's author will provide free books, exclusive videos and their top three recommended reads (link here). This week's guest author is Jacqueline Wilson.

The major mobile networks are planning to make access to Oak Academy data free to browse until schools reopen and we are expecting the date this takes effect to be published in the next week. (https://www.bbc.co.uk/news/technology-55719428)

Remote Learning

We continue to be extremely impressed by students' attitude to learning and engagement in their live lesson and in completing the work set up by their teachers. A total of 3864 merits have been awarded over the last five school days, with a third of these being for 'outstanding effort in remote learning.' A reminder that students must complete all tasks set on Google Classroom; parents can check on their child's engagement with these tasks through Insight as teachers will give an F1 where assignments are not completed. These tasks are as important to their learning as their attendance in the live lessons as these are where students apply what they have learned.

Students should be working for around 45 minutes of each lesson, whether in a live lesson or completing the work. We would encourage parents to support their children in taking these breaks, and in trying to take time away from screens during these lesson breaks, as well as at break and lunch time.

We began a trial of *student cameras on* during some Year 13 lessons this week, and will continue this in some sixth form lessons again next week. In a lesson with cameras on, students must only turn their cameras on at the request of the teacher, and blur their background (or, where this is not possible due to technology, ensure they will not be interrupted and sit against a neutral background). It is not mandatory for students to turn their cameras on if they are uncomfortable doing so.

Punctuality

Please ensure your child logs into timetabled lessons at the correct start time every day. This will help maximise learning in the 45 minutes of lesson time so that we can still allow students a break and a stretch in between.

LRC News


Well done to all the students who are borrowing books from the eLibrary and a reminder that the LRC App has lots of information and resources to help you with remote learning.

An open letter from the Director of Children's services about education provision in schools, for parent/ carers of children and young people with SEND

Jenny Coles, the Director of Children's Services for Hertfordshire County Council has sent out an open letter for all parent/ carers of children and young people with SEND in Hertfordshire.

The letter gives information about how schools and the local area are working to meet your child's needs in these difficult times.

The letter highlights key points from the Department for Education's <u>school national restrictions guidance</u> and further details about the situation in Hertfordshire, including:

- school attendance rules for children with EHCPs
- when school closures may occur due to health and safety reasons
- provision for support outlined within EHCPs
- services supporting young people with SEND
