You will need to have achieved a grade 5 or above in any Humanities subject and a grade 5 or above in GCSE English Language.

WHAT WILL I LEARN?

This course provides a coherent and thought-provoking programme of study, developing skills of research, in-depth discussion and analysis highly regarded by universities and employers in a wide variety of diverse sectors.

Students will develop knowledge and understanding of some of the fundamental questions of human existence, gaining valuable insight into historical attempts to answer them and how they shape our view of society and ourselves. In doing so, they will nurture an appreciation of religious, cultural and social beliefs and teachings, debate complex and fascinating issues concerning theoretical and practical ethics and examine the fundamental nature of what it means to be a human being.

Content and assessment overview

The Advanced GCE in Religious Studies consists of three externally examined papers from the OCR examination board, each lasting 2hrs and comprising a third of the total A Level grade.
