Dear Parents/Carers

We know that strong facilities support the range of activities we can offer and I'd like to, once again, thank the ASA for their time and commitment to fund raising and, in turn, enriching students' educational experience. The ASA contributes so much to the festivities at this time of year - the Chapel decorations were stunning at our candlelit Carol Concert (more of that in a minute) and the ever-popular Craft Fair was a hive of festive activity and extremely well attended.

I am sure you would all like to join me in thanking him for continuing to bring his own special 'brightness' to music at Ashlyns.
