Careers

This week marks the culmination of a year-long programme designed to help our Year 10 students begin to create a personal vision for their futures. As part of our Raising Achievement work, this carefully planned sequence of experiences aims to inspire, motivate, and give real-world context as they prepare to enter Year 11. Throughout the year, students have engaged in a wide range of activities to support this vision-building:

- Careers Expo (October) meeting and interacting with a wide range of employers and industries.
- Careers Extended Learning Day (November) exploring different career pathways, preparing CVs, developing employability skills with the RAF along with guest speakers from 7 different industries.
- Mock Interviews developing confidence and communication skills with local employers.
- Apprenticeship Assembly with Cisco & ASK Apprenticeships hearing from real apprentices and employers.

Now, with Work Experience, students are able to apply these insights directly. For some, the week may spark real inspiration and open doors; for others, it may clarify what they don't want to do — both outcomes are equally valuable as they motivate our students to focus, work hard and aim high as they move into Year 11.

Character

At Ashlyns, we place great importance on developing character alongside academic achievement. This is celebrated through our merit system, reward assemblies, and also through the daily recognition of positive actions via students' Character Cards. These cards allow staff to acknowledge moments where students demonstrate our core values — whether that's showing kindness, integrity, independence, or resilience — by awarding signatures.



Respecting Boundaries During Play



Children love to explore and have fun through play and this week, **UNICEF's International Day of Play**, reminds parents and carers to celebrate just how vital it is. Recognising its importance, the United Nations has even declared play a universal right for every child.

Beyond enjoyment, **play supports children's overall wellbeing**. It nurtures mental health, encourages social interaction, sparks new interests, and helps develop physical and emotional skills.

In fact, the world of play and its benefits is much broader and richer than you might realise. These Tooled Up resources will help you reflect on how and why playful experiences are central for your child's development.
